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
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
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

First up is the Milwaukee Film Festival (Oct. 18-Nov. 1, mkefilm.org) that screens at five historic venues across the city. The **Flyway Film Festival** (flywayfilmfestival.org) is in Stockholm and Pepin along the Mississippi River, taking place Oct. 19-21. The **University of Wisconsin-Parkside's Foreign Film Series** (uwp.edu/therita) starts weekends in mid-September and goes until late April (check website for specific weekends). The **Green Bay Film Festival** (*qbfilmfestival.org*) is March 1-3 and typically shows animated, cultural, children and family picks, and more. The Wildwood Film **Festival** commemorates Wisconsin films only (March 22-23, wildwoodfilmfestival. com). The season is bookended by the most well-known celebration, the Wisconsin **Film Festival** (wifilmfest.org), April 4-11. Watch American independent films, international cinema, documentaries and more.

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
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


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#### Wisconsin's Own Walk of Fame

Considered Wisconsin's Grand Dame hotel, the American Club—nestled in the company town of Kohler-celebrated its one hundredth birthday this past August. As any visitor knows, this overnight retreat built in 1918 (initially as lodging for the Kohler Co.'s workers) is a royal experience, from the uniformed bellmen to the masseuses in the Kohler Waters Spa next door. Inside the red-brick exterior lies oak paneling and woodwork, and gorgeous brass furniture. Steel elevator doors emblazoned with a big "W" that were once in the Wisconsin State Capitol Building in Madison pay homage to Walter J. Kohler, the state's 26th governor. Hung in each guest room is a portrait of a famous American, from Ernest Hemingway to John James Audubon.

Food and drink festivities linked to the centennial celebration include special one hundredth anniversary cocktails at The Winery Bar and a seven-course tasting menu at the luxe Immigrant Restaurant (through November). Each course is inspired by a different ethnic group (from Danish to Normandy) that has worked for the plumbing manufacturer since its start in 1873. In that year, John Michael Kohler-an Austrian immigrant who arrived in America as a 10-year-old—started Kohler Co., and it's been in the family ever since.

There are several reasons to make a trip to the American Club this fall and winter. Fresh off a six-month renovation, there are 13 new treatment rooms at Kohler Waters Spa and also new multi-room bedroom suites at the Inn on Woodlake, which falls under the Kohler umbrella and is located one block away.

Related to the centennial celebration, a new sculpture at the American Club by artist-inresidence Stephen Paul Day features a boy draped in an American flag, an homage to John Michael Kohler. It's crafted out of cast iron made in Kohler's factory, which still operates across the street. History buffs can take a historic tour of the property, led daily at 2 p.m. by historians and concierges. A new history exhibit is also in the American Club library, and posters of historic facts are sprinkled throughout the property for a self-guided tour. Also of note: tours of the factory across the street are led by retired workers and provide an authentic glimpse into what it's like to work for this storied manufacturer.



#### **Shoppist** | Fantastic Finds

Madison's Atwood Avenue is now home to a number of excellent restaurants and some great locally-owned boutiques, like Tammy Schreiter's Hatch Art House. Founded in 2010, this shop boasts an enclave of regional (and beyond) artists' work, including prints, jewelry, sculpture, mixed-media pieces and pottery. Schreiter's keen eye means the art she selects is approachable, ever-changing—and importantly, affordable. While there, be sure to check out Schreiter's adorable next-door shop Hazel General Store, too. Opened in 2015, Hazel's enviable assortment of gift items and home goods and irresistible. hatcharthouse.com, hazelgeneralstore.com ew

#### **Rising From** the Ashes

What's old is new again—just ask sisters Carey Sharpe and Jenna Golem, who lovingly restored a 90-plus-year-old building in Oshkosh for use as a multiuse event space, concert hall, café and bowling alley, opening this fall. Named after the duo's late grandfather, The Howard is over 30,000 square feet and full of period-perfect details, like decorative carved moldings on the walls, sparkling chandeliers and a clean black and white aesthetic.

"We opened The Howard ... as a tribute to our hometown that we love so much," says Golem. "It was originally opened 1927 as a male-only Eagles club that fell into disrepair within the last few years. We loved the idea of two sisters reviving a place that was originally built for men-only and restoring it into something that everyone in Oshkosh can enjoy."

The building had already been legendary in its day, hosting headliners such as Johnny Cash and Fleetwood Mac when they came through on tour over the course of the last century. Now the sisters are packing its inaugural 2018-2019 season with Grammy award winners like Shawn Colvin and Marc Cohn, murder mystery dinner theatre events, live bands of all genres and comedy shows. Plus, hit up their café for fresh eats, the bar for a cocktail or even the bowling alley for a few games. Check out thehowardoshkosh.com for details.

Best-selling author Neil Gaiman calls it "a monument to kitsch and wonder and madness and uncertainty" and writes that he had to "tone down" his description of it in his novel "American Gods" in order "to make it believable." What started as a curiously designed home open to the public for tours, gradually has grown into a vast network of rooms and warehouses housing the most unusual collections, from an unnerving room full of dolls to a giant whale and sea monster tangled in battle. The massive carousel spins around with 269 creatures—from lions and elephants to centaurs, mermaids, and other mythological beasts—but not a single horse. *thehouseontherock.com* 








collection of tops, yo-yos and gyroscopes numbers over 2,000. Alternating in operation times is her Logic

Puzzle Museum, a 90-minute program of hands-on

Set on seven acres along the Namekagon River, this museum houses over 50,000 lures and 1,000 vintage motors, plus rods and other antiques related to fishingbut only in fresh water. Executive director Emmett Brown admits the world record musky mount is a reproduction but the real mounts include "some tremendous lake trout from the mid-50s." That's pounds, not the year caught. The Hall of Fame honors more than 400 men and women who have made significant contributions to the sport. 
# GENESEE DEPO

Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne were already big names on Broadway and in the international theatre community in the early 20th century when they came to live in Wisconsin. Built in stages from 1913 into the 1940s, their Genesee Depot estate is better known for the number of chimneys among its three buildings. Famous guests Laurence Olivier and Noël Coward have bedrooms named for them, and a long list of other stars have stayed here. The music room, with its detailed murals, chandeliers, plush armchairs and grand piano with a painting beneath its lid, could be the set of a period play. The entire place with its artifacts, artwork, murals, and antiques is like something from a fantasy world, and the museum foundation itself likens the complex to a personal diary, carefully designed by the Lunts. tenchimneys.org





States," says Helmi Harrington, the curator of this collection of over 1,300 instruments dating back to the accordion's invention. The guided tour is informative and over 130 exhibits reveal the evolution of the accordion, its various styles and elements, and the countries they originated in. A library dedicated to the subject occupies two floors. A concert hall hosts regular events, and group tours include a performance there. Most visitors spend about an hour, but Harrington says "we also get people who come and stay for a year." Indeed, some may stay for extensive research or to help out in the on-site repair workshop, which even has a program to train accordion repair people. Running nine years strong, this beer tasting festival is always near Halloween, so expect to see festival-goers donning costumes and having a spooky good time. Thirty-five Midwest craft brewers and distillers will be on hand-so expect to taste suds and sips from Milwaukee-based Mob Craft Beer, Madison-located One Barrel Brewing Company and Lake Geneva's Lake Geneva Brewing Co. #### Fermentation Fest, Reedsburg

Billing itself as "an annual celebration of live culture in all its forms, from dance to yogurt, poetry to sauerkraut" this festival (taking place October 5-14) is an eclectic mix of art events, demonstrations, cooking classes and more. Partially academic (presentations span from talks on Native American medicines and foods to the future of farming in Wisconsin) to just plain fun (kombucha and home brewing, pretzel and cheesemaking, vegetable fermentation and more), pretty much anyone can find something that interests them here. Don't miss the Farm/Art Dtour that's 50-plus miles of free art installations, roadside poetry, performances and local food. fermentationfest.com

#### **Green County Cheese Days, Monroe**

Held every two years in even years (this year is September 14-16), this highly anticipated fest celebrates from age in all of its glory. After all, the county is home to a dozen creameries including Edelweiss Creamery, Chalet Cheese Co-op and Emmi Roth USA. (The latter consistently wins international and national awards and offers tours of their Alp and Dell Cheese Store in Monoroe, too). Listen to live entertainment, watch the parades, run in the Cheese Days Chase (5K or 10K), shop for arts and crafts and, oh yeah—taste cheese. cheesedays.com

#### **Isthmus Beer & Cheese, Madison**

Pretty much an unbeatable combination, this celebration allows you to taste-test craft brews from an astounding 100-plus brewers from around the U.S., from small (Funk Factory Geuzeria) to large (Sierra Nevada). And what better to pair said beer with than a nibble of cheese from 15-plus cheesemakers, including multiple awardwinner Roth Cheese? Listen to tunes while you savor the warmth of indoors during the January 19, 2019, party. isthmusbeercheese.com

#### Kohler Food & Wine Experience, Kohler

One of the state's most indulgent food celebrations, this fourday extravaganza (October 18-21) features celebrity chefs, cocktails, tastings, culinary seminars and parties—all held throughout the idyllic Destination Kohler. Midwest chefs hold court alongside major international players, like Marcus Samuelsson and Fabio Viviani, for presentations. There's no shortage of fun talks and demonstrations, including pairing rosé and beer can chicken, matching up whiskey and chocolate, and how to select cheeses to go with chocolates. Learn about gnocchi-making, partake in tons of wine tastings and learn about coffee cocktails—it's all here. #### **Warrens Cranberry Festival, Warrens**

When the last weekend in September rolls around, get ready for a celebration of the state's fruit (with lots of known health benefits!) at this fun fest on September 28-30. There's three miles (!) of shopping here, a huge Sunday parade, marsh tours—even "Cranberry Royalty" contestants that extoll the virtues of cranberries. Oh, and did we mention the food? Cranberries Jubilee, pancakes with cranberry syrup, cranberry cream puffs and even deep-fried cranberries on a stick all make an appearance. cranfest.com

#### Wine & Harvest Festival, Cedarburg

For almost 50 years, this celebration kicks off fall (this year on September 15-16) with great food (harvest apple brats, cranberry turkey wraps, gyros, grilled corn), the wines of hometown winery Cedar Creek Winery and The Fermentorium craft brews (also made locally). There's more than just food and wine here though—see more than 250 juried artists in Art on the Avenue, check out the Giant Pumpkin Weigh-Off, participate in Cedar Creek Winery's Grape Stomp, listen to live music and shop in the marketplace. cedarburgfestival.org/wine-harvest-festival ew

From Farm Boy to Rising-Star Chef

When FSR (a trade magazine for the fullservice restaurant industry) came up with a list of 40 rising-star chefs in 2017, almost all of them were working in the nation's largest cities.

Tyler Sailsbery was an exception. He operates two restaurants within three blocks of downtown Whitewater (pop. 14,500), a college town whose lack of localcentric dining is what turned this business major into a professional chef.

Artsy entrées served in a homey setting of refurbished décor defines The Black Sheep, open since 2012. Think ravioli stuffed with lamb sausage, topped with a rosemary cream sauce. Casual Joe's is Sailsbery's more laid-back eatery, featuring barbecued meats and sides (cranberry slaw, golden corn bake, bacon mac 'n cheese), served on no-fuss aluminum trays.

In 2013, Casual Joe's won over judges of the Food Network show "Food Court Wars." The reward: one year of free rent. Prices here are lower than The Black Sheep's, and that—as the chef-owner sees it-makes hyper-local dining accessible to more people.

Lots of chefs aim to cook with the seasons, using locally grown ingredients. Sailsbery understands that goal deeply because he was raised on a farm. Most of his restaurants' key ingredients come from within 50 miles.

"As a farm boy, it just seemed natural to connect the farmer and the foodie," he says. "This was an integral part from the start."


Sailsbery arranges farm dinners and serves his community in other ways too. Jail inmates grow a garden and use the bounty in a five-course dinner for the public, prepared under Sailsbery's supervision. He makes fun food-like sweet potato ice cream-to introduce children to farmers' market fare.

During the winter The Black Sheep's 2.5hour cooking classes are popular. Count pasta-making, food and wine pairings, a sushi primer and butcher talk about meat cuts among the topics covered. ew

Brandy-loving Wisconsin is the top market for California-based Korbel, buying more than one-third of their annual production, but small-batch brandy from Badger State distilleries are gaining attention too. Check out these Wisconsin tasting rooms.



#### AEppelTreow, Burlington

Apple brandy is made with Wisconsin-grown fruit that ages in new, charred barrels of Wisconsin white oak. The award-winning result is more of a modern version of colonial applejack than a French calvados. Their other brandies use pears and grapes. appletrue.com



#### Central Standard Craft Distillery, Milwaukee

Brandy with a hint of chocolate is a smooth combo for two award-winning products distilled for Herb Kohler and KOHLER Original Recipe Chocolates. Serve the dark chocolate brandy or chocolate mint brandy straight up, over ice or in cocktails. thecentralstandard.com, kohlerchocolates.com



#### **Door County Distillery, Carlsville**

Hints of vanilla and caramel in Door County Distillery's traditional brandy come from a blend of red Zinfandel and Viognier wines. Fruit from local orchards turn into wines that are distilled into cherry brandy and an apple brandy (great for hot toddys!). dcwine.com



#### Great Lakes Distillery, Milwaukee

Tiny batches of 80-proof fruit brandy are made from a cornucopia of fruit, and some choices change seasonally. The Artisan Series includes a five-year apple brandy, blueberry, banana, peach, pear, kirschwasser (fermented cherries), strawberry, grappa (grape residue from winemaking) and barrelaged grappa. greatlakesdistillery.com



#### **Infinity Winery & Distillery, Eau Claire**

The distillery's Experimental spirits (and wines) are naturally infused and often a limited, one-time production, like their recently released Experimental Peach Brandy Liqueur that's imbued with fruit grown at home by the distiller's father. Next up: a brandy aged in whiskey barrels, targeted for release before Christmas. infinitybeverages.com



#### Old Sugar Distillery, Madison

The Old Sugar in this distillery's name refers to beet sugar, a part of some spirits. The company's Brandy Station, made with local grapes, is their signature brandy. The Ultimate Brandy Set includes the aforementioned Brandy Station, along with a bottle of Sally Wagon, a pre-mixed Brandy Manhattan; and their Pomeroy Apple Brandy. oldsugardistillery.com



#### Wollersheim, Prairie du Sac

The longtime winery also produces the awardwinning 1876 Press House Brandy, named after the original building used to make brandy on-site in 1876. The formula involves the same varietals used back then too, and the brandy is barrel-aged at least two years before bottling. wollersheim.com



#### Yahara Bay, Madison

Wisconsin-grown Honeycrisp apples turn into apple brandy here, which ages in a bourbon barrel for almost two years. A 2007 batch that aged 10 years was released in 2017. All of the distiller's products began in a 90-gallon copper still nicknamed "CARL." yaharabay.com ew

#### **Make Mine Sweet**

Wisconsin's unofficial state cocktail hands down, is the Old Fashioned. The classic recipe begins with the muddling of a maraschino cherry, orange slice, sugar cube and splash of bitters. Then comes ice, but what happens next depends on the bartender, and customer whims.

Brandy is the liquor typically used. Expect to decide on "sweet or sour" because lemon-lime soda (for sweet) or a sour mixer tops the drink off.


Menus at The Old Fashioned, a popular restaurant and bar on Madison's Capitol Square, embrace the Badger State's most beloved food and drink traditions. That includes at least seven types of the namesake cocktail. The Northern Exposure involves Kessler's, and the Applejack uses apple brandy. The rye bourbon version substitutes brown sugar for a granulated cube. The Orange Rum requires orange-flavored rum.

Although Angostura bitters is the universal favorite to enhance an Old Fashioned, aficionados get picky about cocktail garnishes-but that's a story for another time. theoldfashioned.com

# **AMNICON FALLS**

The geological wonder that is Amnicon Falls State Park lies north of US-2 and serves as a scenic rest stop or a night's stay in the campground. From a covered bridge you can see the Upper Falls to one side, and the Lower Falls to the other—the former falling over ancient volcanic rock; the latter, Lake Superior sandstone. Hike the short loop trail and see a third falls on the Amnicon River, and in rainy periods, a fourth, the appropriately named Now and Then Falls.

Don't Miss: Farther east along US-2 in Iron River is White Winter Winery, makers of a variety of meads (sweet and dry honey wines), plus spirits and non-alcoholic spritzers. Eat at the Delta Diner southeast of there, a 1940s aluminum diner with food worth traveling hours for (and people do!).





### **BROWNSTONE FALLS**

While the namesake cascade at Copper Falls State Park is indeed impressive from where you look down on it from the hiking trail above the 100-foot gorge, it's usually the 30-foot Brownstone Falls people come to see. The former is on the Bad River; the latter is a short walk away on Tyler Forks, where it joins the Bad River and flows north to Lake Superior.

Don't Miss: For some comfort food or a Friday fish fry, head up US-13 a few miles to High Bridge Oasis.








# **BIG MANITOU FALLS**

You'll hear the thundering water long before you see it. Tumbling 165 feet, this is the tallest waterfall east of the Mississippi. The trails here at Pattison State Park bring you close enough to look down into the gorge and see the rush of whitewater from several different angles. Extend your hike into the park and you can also see Little Manitou Falls.

Don't Miss: Head north to Superior to the Anchor Bar, famous for its creative burgers. Try the cashew and Swiss burger and some fresh-cut fries. Be sure to see the Richard I. Bong Veterans Historical Center, named for the Wisconsin native and America's greatest flying ace to date.









# MARINETTE COUNTY WATERFALLS

Here lies the highest concentration of waterfalls in the state. There are 15 named falls spread throughout the county, most of them reachable in a single day if you get an early start. Hikes to each range from a dozen steps to a half-mile. From Long Slide Falls cascading 50 feet through a narrow cut in the rock to the easily accessible rushing whitewater of Dave's Falls, the self-guided tour explores one of the more remote corners of Wisconsin.


Don't Miss: The rich forest here was once laid low by one of the most devastating fires in American history-head south to learn more at the Peshtigo Fire Museum. Stop for pizza at Peppino's while you're in town.

### LOST CREEK FALLS

Simple and elegant, and highly photogenic if you catch it right, this eight-foot waterfall lies at the end of a 2.2mile out-and-back hike into pristine forest. The creek slips over a ledge with enough space that you can stand behind the waterfall.

Don't Miss: Halvorson Fisheries out of Cornucopia sells its catch-whitefish, lake trout, and salmon-fresh, frozen or smoked.





## POTATO RIVER FALLS

Northeast of Copper Falls State Park is this awesome series of whitewater cascades. The Upper Falls drops 20 feet at a time, twice, while the Lower Falls plunges 30 feet in one go. Views of either can be reached by some stairs and dirt trails from the parking lot.


Don't Miss: Head up to Ashland to see a city full of murals, taste the brews at South Shore Brewery and stop for coffee at the Black Cat Coffeehouse.



### MORGAN FALLS

This waterfall is unlike all the others. Inside the Chequamegon National Forest in a shaded gorge, Morgan Creek descends over 70 feet along a narrow trough carved into the gorge wall, almost as if someone channeled it that way. Near trail level it then pours out of the side of that channel into a pool before you.

Don't Miss: While the hike to the falls is just over a mile round-trip, you shouldn't miss the climb up St. Peter's Dome on the same trail. From the top you have a clear view out over the forest all the way to Lake Superior.  $\in$ W



Birthday parties usually last a day, unless you're the Green Bay Packers, which turns 100 years old in 2019—and the Pack is already celebrating.

Football fans watched a free game on September 14, 1919, as their new home team competed on a vacant lot next to the future high school. Players were paid from pass-the-hat donations. A \$500 donation covered uniforms and equipment. The donor was the Indian Packing Company, and the star was coach/halfback Earl "Curly" Lambeau. The season record ended at 10-1. And the impact? Titletown USA is born.


Today the Packers are one of 32 National Football League teams, yet it's unique. It's the smallest city that has an NFL team. No other major, professional sports team in the United States remains not-for-profit and publicly owned like the Packers.

Each home game during the 2018-19 season is devoted to a different decade of team history. On display at the Packers Hall of Fame is "The Origins of Glory," which explores the team's first year and how the NFL franchise was born. Coming in 2019 is "100 Seasons," a definitive book about the team.

The team's evolving Titletown District gives football fans new reasons to linger near Lambeau. The complex includes a plaza with outdoor shuffleboard, ping pong tables, horseshoes, cornhole and foosball play stations. On a roomy, cushy playground is gridironinspired equipment, next to a 40-yard-dash track and full-sized football field. Come winter, ice skating and a hill for tubing appear.

Among Titletown's anchors is Hinterland, a craft brewery with restaurants, and LODGE KOHLER, upscale accommodations with water-inspired spa treatments and the fifth-floor Taverne in the Sky with a lengthy wine list. The restaurant has a wall of windows that faces the stadium, a mere 100 yards away.









#### CATCH THE GREEN AND GOLD FEVER

It's all good, but Green Bay has long loved, lived and breathed football, regardless of reason or season. Here's a little bit of where to tour and toast the team outside of the stadium.

#### **ALLOUEZ CATHOLIC CEMETERY**

At rest here since 1965 is Curly Lambeau—his modest grave marker is near the Webster Street entrance. Much easier to find is an elevated bronze statue of this legendary team founder, star and coach—at Lambeau Field's main entrance.

#### CHILDREN'S MUSEUM OF GREEN BAY

Kids have a place to practice their Lambeau Leap, learn about football gear and get a hands-on introduction to tailgating. Inside little lockers is oversized clothing to turn youngsters into a sports announcer, football coach or player. gbchildrensmuseum.org

#### **HAGEMEISTER PARK**

This popular restaurant on the Fox River downtown is named after the team's first playing field and has 20-plus TVs and old-time team photos, inside and out. On the meaty menu is chili (ladled over noodles), pierogi stroganoff and lots of pub fare. hagemeisterpark.com

#### **NEVILLE PUBLIC MUSEUM**

A permanent exhibit at the local history repository is "Hometown Advantage: The Community and The Packers," which documents personal relationships between the community, team and players throughout Packers history. nevillepublicmuseum.org

#### **PACKERS HERITAGE TRAIL**

Historical markers at 20-plus sites identify significant points in team history. Walk and drive at your own pace. Other options include Segway and trolley tours, as weather permits. packersheritagetrail.com, candmpresents.com, glidenew.com

#### TITLETOWN BREWING

Count Johnny Blood Red, an Irish red ale, among the year-round go-to brews made by the downtown craft brewer. It's a longtime tribute to Johnny "Blood" McNally, the early time Pro Football Hall of Fame halfback. *titletownbrewing.com* 

#### **UNION HOTEL**

The favorite haunt of long-ago football greats is one year older than the team, and a longtime equipment manager lived upstairs for 40 years. Venture over for a retro setting and supper-club-style dinner. Order before 9 p.m. facebook.com/unionhoteldepere

#### ALL ABOUT APPLETON

Just 30 miles from Green Bay, Appleton also boasts attractions with Packers ties, too.

#### **GRIDIRON GREATS**

Relive pro football highlights at "Gridiron Glory: The Best of the Pro Football Hall of Fame" until January 6 at the History Museum at the Castle in downtown Appleton, 30 miles southwest of Green Bay. This is the only Wisconsin stop for the 6,000-square-foot, traveling exhibition from Canton, Ohio.

Expect an unusual blend of championship remnants here (examples: a Jim Taylor jersey, a 1929 championship football, a 1967 Ice Bowl failed heating coil), cultural influences (Brian Piccolo's jacket, a nod to the 1971 "Brian's Song" movie), interactive things (ways for you to referee), lessons on science (helmet-radio communication evolution) and racism (obstacles to equality). myhistorymuseum.org

#### **COACH'S CUT**

Open year-round and five blocks away from the History Museum is Vince Lombardi's Steakhouse, whose décor is all about artifacts from the legendary Packer coach's estate. Count fan mail from U.S. presidents, family photos, high school yearbooks, handwritten game plays, trophies and personal possessions among the 400-plus treasures. vincelombardisteakhouse.com ew



#### Sauk Prairie Bald Eagle Watching Days, January 18-19, 2019

The bald eagle has really made a comeback in Wisconsin, and sightings in summer are pretty common. But in winter they will gather in abundance around open water looking for a meal. The Wisconsin River between Sauk City and Prairie du Sac (jointly called Sauk Prairie) remains unfrozen beneath the dam and dozens of the majestic birds perch in the bare branches along shore. This weekend event brings in a crowd with binoculars. Watch for free public lectures, and stop at the viewing area in Prairie du Sac, overlooking Eagle Island, for telescope viewing in a protected area ideal for photographing eagles.

Good Eats: Vintage Brewing Co. is family-friendly and has a deck overlooking the river for a good chance to spot more eagles. The Blue Spoon Cafe is a casual spot with upscale, fresh cafe offerings on the river—and is good for breakfast. If you're looking for a supper club experience, try Green Acres or the German-themed Dorf Haus.



#### Lake Geneva Winterfest, January 26-February 3, 2019

You'll find snow art in a number of places, but nothing this good. Lake Geneva hosts the U.S. National Snow Sculpting Competition during this weeklong winter festival. Fifteen teams travel from all over the country to Flatiron Park and the Riviera Plaza, where with great skill and detail, they fashion snow into amazing sculptures over nine feet tall. But it's not just a spectator's week: taste the entries of the chili cook-off, participate in the human sled dog races, listen to live music, laugh at comedy shows, check out magic acts and take the family on a Cocoa Crawl at a gaggle of downtown establishments. An assortment of area resorts and bed and breakfasts offer a respite from the cold, perhaps with more hot chocolate and some time around a warm hearth.

The Ice Judge Cometh: The sculptors themselves judge the sculptures based on creativity, technique and message to award first, second and third place. Additionally, the public votes for the People's Choice Awards.

# Hudson Hot Air Affair, February 1-3, 2019

Nothing says winter quite like ... hot air balloons? At least, that's how it is along the St. Croix River in Hudson. A calendar of countdown events lead up to this three-day weekend. Friday evening features balloonists shooting bursts of fire into the night as they roll along a parade route amid kazoo marching bands, ending with fireworks over the river. More than 30 balloons launch at sunrise on Saturday and Sunday, and in the evening they inflate once more, lighting up the dark with glowing colors-making for some dazzling photo ops. Other activities include bingo and a pancake breakfast, kite-flying and ice-carving shows, and a fun run and an ice-fishing derby. Take part in some geocaching and a bit of birdwatching: eagles and trumpeter swans winter here.

Don't Miss: See a current art gallery or catch a show at The Phipps Center for the Arts. Or, learn some local history on a tour of the Octagon House Museum.

#### **CANDLEWOOD CABINS.** RICHLAND CENTER

#### **BACKSTORY**

Once upon an 80 acres circa 1995, in Richland Center, Norbert and Susan Calnin started Candlewood Cabins with just one cabin. Today, there are five, including three glass cabins. All offer expansive views, nature trails on the property, and are enjoyed by visitors from all over the world.

#### WHY STAY HERE

"It's really very private," says Norbert. "People feel like they have their own space ... and are able to interact with each other and have contact with nature."

#### WHAT DO DO

Candlewood offers on-site nature trails, and there are also five state parks or county recreation areas within an hour's drive. Frank Lloyd Wright's Taliesin is only a 30-minute drive. In winter, the main house rents out snowshoes.

#### HOW TO BOOK

International press on the glass cabins has increased demand beyond the owner's wildest expectations—currently, reservations before 2020 are limited. Rates range from \$140 to \$245 a night, depending on the cabin selected, for the 2020 season. If you're feeling spontaneous, watch their social media pages for last-minute cancellations. You can book online at candlewoodcabins.com/reservations.



#### **CANOE BAY & ESCAPE VILLAGE, CHETEK**

#### **BACKSTORY**

Canoe Bay is a former church camp that has been transformed into a couple's-only retreat and is now in its 26th year. Two hours east of Minneapolis, and one hour north of Eau Claire, the property boasts 27 upscale units. Most are freestanding cottages, but six are in multi-unit buildings. Adjacent to Canoe Bay is ESCAPE Village, an enclave of uniquely designed, eco-friendly tiny homes for those who want to try the small life. If it suits you, you can order one for delivery just about anywhere in the United States.

#### WHY STAY HERE

"It's a quick detox for everything that is stressful about modern life," says Lisa Dobrowolski, who owns the resort with her husband, Dan. "There's immense peace and quiet."

#### WHAT TO DO

You're always welcome, and even encouraged, to do nothing. Inroom massages are available to make your nothing even more relaxing. The lodge features books and DVDs for guests. In winter, crosscountry and downhill skiing are close by, and you can snowshoe for free on the property. A three-course dinner in the glass-enclosed, lakeside dining room is also available for \$170 per couple.

#### HOW TO BOOK

A basic room starts at \$350 a night, with a two-night minimum, and goes up to \$999 a night for the Edgewood Villa. Rates include breakfast and access to Wahdon Lake and nature trails. Tiny homes in ESCAPE Village start at \$195 a night. Some amenities in Canoe Bay not be available in the ESCAPE Village. Visit canoebay.com and escapevillages.com to book.







## **MCINTYRE'S RESORT, DELAVAN**

#### THE BACKSTORY

Want a cabin your grandparents would recognize? Check out McIntyre's Resort on beautiful, spring-fed Turtle Lake in Delavan. These beautifully preserved time capsules were the original cabins at Lake Lawn Resort, on nearby Delavan Lake. Owned today by Pat McIntyre, the tiny resort was purchased by her father, Louis, a police officer, in the 1940s.

#### WHY STAY HERE

Humble, family-run resorts like this were once common throughout the Midwest. "It's magical here," says Pat. "It's a special place, and people feel it the moment they arrive."

#### WHAT TO DO

Turtle Lake, just steps from the cabins, is ideal for rowing or paddle boating, which McIntyre's offers free to guests. Ice fishing is good in the winter. Enjoy breakfast at Elizabeth's Cafe on the historic brick road in downtown Delavan. Outdoor enthusiasts can hike, bike or ski in the southern unit of the Kettle Moraine.

#### HOW TO BOOK

Call Pat directly at (262) 728-9313. Rates start at \$125, depending on the season and the number of people staying.





#### STILL BEND/THE BERNARD **SCHWARTZ HOUSE, TWO RIVERS**

#### THE BACKSTORY

If staying in a Frank Lloyd Wright designed home is on your bucket list, Still Bend is calling. The home was built in 1939 for Two Rivers businessman Bernard Schwartz via LIFE Magazine's Dream House program. In 2003, it was purchased by Michael Ditmer and his brother, Gary, with the goal of making it something the masses could enjoy.

#### WHY STAY HERE

"What I love about the home is, I'm sure, what other people love about the home—it's the warmth and grandeur all in the same space," says Michael.

#### WHAT TO DO

Two Rivers is still active as a deep-water fishing port, and features a lighthouse on the National Register of Historic Places. Plenty of hiking trails abound and the community is along Lake Michigan. Be sure to enjoy a Wisconsin supper club experience at Machut's.

#### HOW TO BOOK

Off season, rates start at \$350 a night with a two-night minimum. Online booking is available at theschwartzhouse.com/renting.

#### **RUSTIC YURTS, BAYFIELD**

#### **BACKSTORY**

Genghis Kahn stayed in yurts, and you can, too. The forestry department in Bayfield tested the yurt waters with structures in Cable and Mt. Ashwabay. It went so well they added a second yurt in Mt. Ashwabay. It's a humble way to lodge, and you have to hike about a half-mile in and bring all of your own bedding. Restrooms are primitive, but the yurts are available year-round, thanks to a wood stove for heating. All cooking must be done outdoors, just like Khan did, and firewood is provided.

#### WHY STAY HERE

"It's basically a big tent. You can hear all the noises outside and it's a lot less work. It's definitely a very cool experience. It's camping without a lot of work," says Jen Bratsch, a recreation forester with Bayfield.

#### WHAT TO DO

Heard of forest bathing? Well, this is the place to do it—simply bathe in what nature offers. In fall and winter you can hike, cross-country ski or snowshoe. Enjoy dinner at one of the many great restaurants in Bayfield near the Ashwabay yurt that feature fresh Lake Superior whitefish and trout. In Cable, it's easy to pop into town to enjoy a meal at the Rookery Pub, Rivers Eatery or the Brickhouse Café.

#### **HOW TO BOOK**

The yurts sleep six, and booking is only available on airbnb.com. ew

(this general store with a modern twist celebrates Midwest makers of candles, clothing and more), eclecticism rides high in downtown La Crosse. Score from big to small-from a chic necklace or an upcycled farmhouse-style tableat Painted Porch, or pick up some new-to-you titles to cozy up with

this winter at Pearl Street Books, which sells new and used books. Surf & Scotch, a new arrival to Pearl Street, lets you bask in the glow of casual surf-town couture, things like graphic tees and Herschel Supply Co.'s backpacks in fun prints and hues. For the tots in your life, pick up gifts at The Toy Shop, open since 2015 and specializing in brands like Melissa & Doug. The two-year-old Willow Boutique specializes in gals' attire, from athleisure to LBDs.

#### **FEST IT UP**

Dubbed the "River of Festivals," La Crosse's festival scene doesn't dim when the weather cools.

Celebrating 58 years in 2018, Oktoberfest (Sept. 27-30) is so big that it spans two festival grounds (Copeland Park and where La Crosse Street meets 2nd Street downtown). Here, live German entertainment meets sampling German-style beers. oktoberfestusa.com

Hosted at Riverside Park, the Rotary Lights Holiday Display (Nov. 23-Dec. 31) is the state's largest light display. It's as much about the glowing lights as it is interacting with live reindeer or jogging in the 5K Ugly Sweater Run. rotarylights.org

The La Crosse Storytelling Festival (Sept. 7-8), the state's only storytelling festival held in Myrick Park, reveals some great yarns to put you on the edge of your seat. The weekend after Labor Day kicks off on Friday night with spooky tales, followed by a family-friendly Saturday daytime lineup and the evening's adult-only cabaret show. lacrossestoryfest.com







#### FROM DAY TO NIGHT

Put on your comfiest shoes because you're going to log many steps through downtown La Crosse, blending a mix of historic and contemporary sites.

**9 A.M.** Grab coffee and powder-dusted beignets at The Parlour, the ground-floor, vintageinspired café inside the Charmant Hotel, and linger over the paper.

9:45 A.M. Stroll in Riverside Park, which hugs the Mississippi River, and take time to relax on a park bench.

**11 A.M.** It's time to shop! Downtown's boutiques retail everything from used books to cool tees.

1 P.M. Break for lunch—pick burgers and beer at the three-year-old The Crow, like a cheese curd burger, Aloha burger or Sriracha bourbon pork burger. Or, the vegetarian-friendly The Root Note has lots of choices, like the cheesy, savory crepes. You won't be sorry!

3 P.M. Work off that lunch with a hike up Grandad Bluff. Bring your camera to capture the view-in addition to Wisconsin views, you might see Iowa!

**5 P.M.** Split antipasto dishes like the gorgonzola fondue, shrimp crostini and hot artichoke dip paired with wines, at Kate's on State, a California-inspired Italian eatery.

**7:30 P.M.** Treat yourself to a live show—such as a musical, play or concert—at the Weber Center for Performing Arts. If it's a dark night, take in a current blockbuster hit at the beautifully restored Rivoli Theatre.








# **GET MOVING**

Grandad Bluff, a 600-foot-tall city-owned bluff on La Crosse's east side, is a favorite hiking spot for locals. On a clear day, the panoramic view of La Crosse is stunning. In town for New Year's Eve? You're lucky: since the late 1920s, a fireworks show is set off on the bluff at the stroke of midnight—it's La Crosse's version of the ball drop in Manhattan. You're likely to see the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse campus, I-90 and the gorgeous Mississippi River, as well as two neighboring states (Iowa and Minnesota). Once white powder hits, Mt. La Crosse Ski Resort, open since 1959, is open daily for downhill skiing and snowboarding. There are 18 slopes and trails, and three chair lifts plus one rope tow. If you're brave enough, test your fear on the Damnation, which is the Midwest's steepest trail. Next to Grandad Bluff, Hixon Forest Park is a premiere spot for cross-country skiing, with trails dutifully groomed by the city after each snowfall. Distances on the trails range from 1K to 8K, depending on skill level and time available to ski. That one of the entrances is near Bluffside Tavern means you can easily grab a pint after!











#### **CHARMING CHARMANT**

Part of the the Aparium Hotel Group-which also restored the Iron Horse Hotel in Milwaukee—the 67-room, red-brick Charmant Hotel debuted in the fall of 2015, inside the shell of a former 1898 candy factory. (Each guest even receives chocolates at checkin.) Guests pull in to the cobblestone street out front, a block from the Mississippi River and Riverside Park. Luxury is literally at every level, from the chai lattes in the darling Parlour café downstairs to the seasonal rooftop terrace's vertical garden (serving cocktails like Mississippi Mules and wood-fired pizzas). Farm-to-table is the real deal at the hotel's The Restaurant, using ingredients from organic prairie beef to Hook's award-winning cheddar, and the wine list features some gems. Rooms feature exposed-brick walls and antique-style furnishings, plus spa-like baths. thecharmanthotel.com



Too cold and frosty outside to wander around? For dinner and a movie under one roof, visit the Rivoli Theatre and Pizzeria—originally a 1920s vaudeville theatre—and now a historic treasure. Movies are all first-run and the café is open for lunch and dinner. Got restless kids? Check out The Children's Museum of La Crosse, with its extremely interactive exhibits like a decommissioned fire truck, pint-sized bank and store, and threestory treehouse. Or, hunker down in a cool café with a steaming-hot mocha or hot chocolate, like at the Jules Coffee House, whose closure in 2014 after 20 years devastated locals—only to reopen seven months later. Eats include bowls of chili, cupcakes and scones baked fresh each morning. Pearl Street Brewery's 16 beers on tap in the taproom (open evenings only) prove that creative minds are behind the scene, with titles like Smokin' Hemp Porter (yep, brewed with toasted hemp seeds) and Breakfast Beer among the selections. Live music is on Fridays and tours take place Friday evenings and Saturday afternoons.



## **EXCELLENT EGGS** (AND MORE)

Make the most of a lazy weekend with a leisurely brunch. At Fayze's, you won't eat light-opt for hearty dishes like a "Chunky Monkey" waffle (a Belgian waffle topped with bananas, sweet cream cheese, chocolate chips and sauce, and whipped cream) or stuffed egg burritos, paired with a signature Bloody Mary. Behind the sunny-yellow door at the Breakfast Pub & Club, items riff on '80s films (case in point: "Kevin Bacon Bones" and "Mr. Mom's Breakfast Tacos"). Uptowne Café & Bakery's house-made biscuits with honey butter and jam are legendary, as are its trio of signature breakfast hashes cooked in a cast-iron skillet. Enjoy your breakfast with one of their refreshing mimosas. eW


